

09/09/2016. Barwon Prison. (Intervention: Mental Illness – Follow –up Review edited). (Depressed) He feels depressed, stressed with the move to the new unit he can't exercise. He keeps walking inside his cell until he is dizzy, he is after a larger space, he was on Zoloft 150mg few months ago when he wanted to reduce to 100mg, now he wants to increase the dose to 150mg daily.

29/10/2016. Barwon Prison. Ali stated he is feeling extremely low due to the change in location to Olearia, and the lack of socialising and exercise equipment. He is on Zoloft and this was increased on 10/09/2016 from 100mg to 150 mg due to lack of perceived efficacy. Looks tired easily engaged with good eye contact. Described self as "depressed –kept in conditions not suitable for human beings- I think I am going crazy- "Sometimes goes outside and screams to let out his frustrations". Flat restricted affect- did get passionate when describing the injustice of his situation and conditions but then back to flat.

Sleep –poor- initial and middle insomnia "because I am going crazy thinking".

Appetite –poor- only eats toast for breakfast then has lunch- does not eat dinner (has IDDM).

Exercise – "cannot exercise –no room and no equipment".

31/10/2016. Barwon Prison. Depressed –really struggling with the conditions in Olearia.

04/11/2016 Barwon Prison. (Depression) Depression, mood low, energy low, self-esteem low, says awake up all night, says Zoloft is not working him, no suicidal thoughts, discuss meditation, yoga, advised to book an appointment with Psychiatrist/ Psych nurse.

13/11/2016. Barwon Prison. Seen in day room in unit –contact – did not adjust his ADT medications. Same as last presentations- obviously low in mood- frustrated- frequently gesticulating- states he is regularly screaming in his cell –just not coping well. He has not been seen by MOU –frustrated by this –states he is innocent of all charges relating to MRC riot and has video and affidavits to prove it, but the prosecution keeps adjourning the case –been waiting 18/12 months in SLOT now. States his head is just "going everywhere", sleep pattern severely disrupted from no sleep to over sleep. "I just can't handle it –not walking – not talking – I am an IDDM – I feel like a gorilla in a cage"

Ali is on Zoloft and this was increased on 10/9/2016 from 100mg to 150mg due to lack of efficacy. Looks tired, easily engaged with good eye contact. Described himself as "depressed" flat restricted affect – did get somewhat passionate when describing the injustice of his situation and conditions but then back to flat.

17/11/2016, Barwon Prison. Has been on 24 hour lockdown past 2-3 months in Olearia.

Previously in Melaleuca since M R C riot mid- 2015. Finds Olearia far more difficult to cope with.

Struggling with lack of social contact with other prisoners. At Interview: Describes the following, * usually feels sad ++, at times laughs and sings to himself to try to cheer himself up. *restless sleep, * diminished appetite, * "sometimes I wish I was dead. –won't do it because of my religion but I ask God to take me while I am asleep." *strong feelings of having been unjustly treated. "What have I done to deserve this?"

Current Medications Sertaline 150 mg/Day. No c/o side effects.

10/12/2016, Barwon Prison. (Seen in dayroom- contact). Ali has been frustrated with the wait for court. Today he was similar in presentation- frustrated and hopeless- he is screaming when it gets too much. He was given some mandalas to colour in of dogs and cats- he has theses pets which he really adores- but can't be bothered to do them. Easily engaged- pleasant and polite, described self

as "just the same-every day I am more depressed and stressed- no energy to do anything-just over thinking all the time". Some reactivity- gesticulates with passion, sleep –poor, appetite- poor.

(Depression- Mx) On Zoloft -150 mg advice and counselling given.³⁶

SOLJA 43517. EXPOSING "THEM" CAGED UNTOLD RESURRECTED/REBORN!

ACCUSED: Sorry to interrupt, I'm conscious - see, I have been requesting for three months now, okay, and I have been in a couple of times, I have had a few self-harm attempts, and zoo this is the thing, Your Honour, there are so many issues, okay, when they first told me, first indicated to me I was going to face you and you know from my 400 page document, my plea submissions, okay, that I would go out hunting and I tried (indistinct) as possible, you know, it seemed to me you're up before Terry Forrest, pardon the language, fuck, I don't want to front that cunt.

HIS HONOUR: I have heard that before.

ACCUSED: Then I said to myself, you know what, they smashed me out of the ballpark last time, I have to actually, I have to clear that from my mind to present, to present, the presentation of who I really am, you don't know how much, like the isolation, sorry, from the isolation, they said they try to say I was half-way intractable,

ACCUSED: Okay, listen, I know that, you sat down and read that other one, 440, and this is the thing, remember the police submission okay, that I presented, that, whatever you want to call it, the life of mars, if you want me to quote ya, I mean, I knew that I would sacrifice myself by presenting that material okay because it was so confronting, and related to my offending behaviour, but I found I had to at the time show and demonstrate what isolation does, the lack of preparation for release, this was mitigating features in my offending behaviour.

HIS HONOUR: If you are not prepared to relax, calm down and listen to me for a couple of minutes, I will have to turn the video off, I don't want to do that, I want to try and set in process something for 21 November or just before then. Are you repaired to let me talk or are you just going to keep talking?

ACCUSED: This is what isolation does, do you know that.

HIS HONOUR: All right.

HIS HONOUR: Yes. All right. This will probably fall on deaf ears, but I strongly advise you to secure legal representation.

ACCUSED: Well, sold out again? Like Beck (?), done, he wasn't prepared on the appeal to follow my instructions, did I attack the issues, the points, the grounds of what occurred with Saul Holt's actions and conduct behaviour, the big brother syndrome come together, you know what I mean, it is the brotherhood, your fellow colleagues, they weren't prepared to go and get stuff, respected men, after a senior judge, okay, in the courts, and think close ranks. What choice did I, what chance did I have, really at the end of the day, I had none, you know what, I don't care, because I have got my

story out, I have got presentation, I have got the exposure MOU (?), you know what I mean, the book is now, they can't shut it down, the genie is in the bottle, I knew I was going die, I knew I was going to - - -

HIS HONOUR: Think you want the genie to come out of the bottle, I don't think you want it to remain in the bottle, but. **ACCUSED: The bottle now, everything is out of it now.**

ACCUSED: One thing? On my case, you talk, these onerous conditions of incarceration, okay, those conditions, in turn, consideration in my sentencing. I arrived at 14 years. Now eh, that one will serve. What would I have got if it wasn't for the - I'm just curious because you never, ever indicated what, with Steve, if there hadn't have been lockdown, 23 hour lockdown, you know what I mean, seriously, I'm just curious, you know, because when you are suffering post-traumatic stress and that's like, normally around a quarter off, and isolation is normally a quarter off, if I do the deductions, do the math, you're right, 14, okay, but what would I have got if getting them, by the way, for the record, I'm in solitary confinement, I haven't, nothing has changed.

HIS HONOUR: All right. I'm going to adjourn this matter until, what did we say, 15 November.²⁹

HIS HONOUR: None of that should stop you from including in your material that you're sending to me or to the court by 23 December, any material relating to that offending you want to send to me, just send it to the court, all right.

ACCUSED: Okay. Um, now - - MR ROSE: And if we can be copied in too, Your Honour.

HIS HONOUR: Yes, and the Crown.

ACCUSED: Yes. Psych report - now, what I was going to say to you, Your Honour, **you know I'm a passionate campaigner, okay, that I fell on the sword, remember the 440 page Life of Mars.**

HIS HONOUR: I do remember that, yes.

ACCUSED: Okay, to try and campaign, to try and bring awareness to the prison system, to isolation and its damaging impact and stuff like that. I didn't really care about myself, I scare mongered a little bit, as the Herald Sun would do, okay, to draw attention and spot light and focus to the situation, circumstances effects many inmates, okay, both in New South Wales and Victoria, to try and change things, okay. That was turned into a book, okay. Now, unfortunately, the author, hijacked it, okay, and diluted it, polluted it, contaminated it - no longer a true crime, a crime fiction. Okay, so I'm a bit disappointed of the outcome but there's passages, passages that I've amended - I've shown, identified the false entries and passages so this will turn into a script. I've got 57,130 words for a script and that's going to be factual and I'm thinking, really seriously thinking about John Silvester handling it, okay.

HIS HONOUR: He will be thrilled.

ACCUSED: Now, this is the thing, I want to tell my life, everything, even as we speak now, this is going to be a part of it, okay. I want people to know and learn, not badness, the person that was molded from badness, molded into badness and changed and people see, that's my legacy. I want something good to come out of this, not negative stuff. I want people to see and recognise the, just the failures, you know what I mean. There's nothing to be gained or - that was the whole thing, the purpose of my conduct actions for the community, for the safety of the community at the end of the day, seriously, Your Honour, and that's what I was sentenced on for the protection of the community

but I'm try to, you know, the Office of Corrections, it's not working there. This is making people - we've got a new Olearia Unit built, a 40 bed unit, you know, like, there's two-thirds of the inmates are all on isolation. They have no contact with other - with anyone, no other inmates or nothing, just officers 24/7. It's not happening - if these people are damaged, they are violent, okay, they've got histories and it's just manifesting compounding. That's what it's all about for me, Your Honour, okay. So I haven't finished with that and that's my ambition. I'm not really concerned about the outcome. I want to make sure before I leave this world, I don't know if I am going to be here for your court, your sentence, and that's the truth, but I want to promote as much as I can, do what I can to generate interest and awareness.

HIS HONOUR: All right.

ACCUSED: - - - during this lifetime, okay, and that's the thing. Now, this is the dilemma I face now. That was first and foremost. Nothing's changed from that, okay.

HIS HONOUR: Yes, I understand that.

ACCUSED: And this is the thing - I can achieve this without doing what I have to do, I mean to make a point, whatever. HIS HONOUR: Yes.

ACCUSED: Okay. Not what was suggested and manipulated. Now, so there's going to be a totally different presentation, landscape. You will see it - I mean, seriously, instead of looking at a Chopper Read we're going to see a Picasso, okay. I'm not saying that - there's two different, one's fictional, one's true.

HIS HONOUR: Yes.

ACCUSED: They are things, they are things that were relevant in the sentencing and they are again too, okay, because it's isolation and the conditions and placing. If you were interested then, okay, you would be interested now.

HIS HONOUR: Well, they're matters that - - -

ACCUSED: Okay, that's exactly - - -

HIS HONOUR: I want to hear it, I want to hear about it on the plea.

ACCUSED: That's the whole point. I say you need to know - - -

HIS HONOUR: Yes.

ACCUSED: - - - the truth, okay. You need to know the facts.

HIS HONOUR: Yes.

ACCUSED: You need to know, you need to - we immediately raise the contamination, the falsehoods, okay. We need to bring all this out, okay, and I'll lead that on post-traumatic stress, okay, remorse, okay, and isolation conditions, and not mentally resilient. All these - these are key components in your decision-making process, okay, that you relied upon on the previous occasion, okay. We have to go again. Now, I'm going to present the same material but I'm - this time you're going to see it, okay.³⁰

There are matters contained in the materials that have been provided by the defence that would tend to indicate or bear out the predictions that Your Honour made when sentencing Mr Binse as he was then sentenced in 2014 that his conditions in custody would impact adversely on his mental health. There have been incidents of a kind that were then already in evidence from 2012 and 2013.

He recounts some of the circumstances that bred his resentment and his anger and what he describes in his letters to police as "the us and them mentality" that he was experiencing at that time.

It's a relevant circumstance to the offending, that's the submission, but he's certainly very young at the time that he was imprisoned in Pentridge and these offences follow that period of imprisonment.

It's a matter also borne out by the psychological reports that are contained in the materials and I'll turn to them as the plea proceeds.

He was in H Division, as Your Honour knows, and found that experience quite brutalising. He describes it as a quasi-military situation where he was made to salute prison officers, he was made to stand on the spot, and Your Honour, as I know from reading the transcript of the last plea hearing, was familiar with the configuration of H Division, it's austerity, it's - - -

HIS HONOUR: Visiting junior solicitors were made to salute prison officers, so it was back in the 80s.

DR FITZGERALD: And visiting junior solicitors would be persons of greater maturity, greater resilience than Mr Pecotic was as a 17-year-old teenager. There is approximately contemporary evidence that he was lacking in mental resilience at that time.

This is a man in whom anti-authoritarian attitudes have been imbued over a long period of time and I'll address rehabilitation and reform in due course. But, in my submission, the tone of this correspondence, the very fact of this correspondence suggests that he has rejected his pro-criminal anti-authoritarian attitudes that have led him to the service of a sentence of 18 years duration.

But that's his motivation. He doesn't want others to idolise or glamorise a life of crime and certainly in reading the record of interview it's not idolised, it's not glamorised in a way that one might expect where an offender and an old investigator are having,

Question 265 is again very discursive. It's the question in which he describes his desire to change the lives of others by making of himself, if necessary, an example, a deterrent example of the consequences to which a criminal life may lead.

He notes that when he was a teenager he looked up to older criminals and wanted to emulate them. He committed those crimes that he could reconcile with his code, as he constructed it, and recognises that it has not led him to a fulfilling life. He doesn't want others to make the same mistakes as him on recent reflection. And the same repudiation of his previous anti-authoritarian attitudes is contained in Question 294. He describes the rather snide sending of postcards to police from interstate, and says, "Well that's how I was. That was the state of mind, it was an us and them, what do I say to you, us and them mentality, it's like really perverse, really profound. It's just me against them, you know". And then somewhat later in that answer attributes that attitude to isolation, which by then he'd already experienced for some time.

He requested in 2014 to be approved for an Art in Cell program which would give him access to painting materials in his cell. That was refused at the time. It was granted in 2015, and the reason that he's pursued that activity is to produce a number of works, the purpose of which is to admonish young offenders and students touring prison facilities of the dangers of criminality and the rigours of prison. At tab 15 of the defence materials, there is a letter from Nick Selisky who is the Assistant General Manager of the Melbourne Assessment Prison, had previously been in a responsible position at Barwon, and that letter acknowledges the completion of paintings reflecting the dangers of crime and drug use and what I've referred to globally as some didactic writings being poems about the experience of incarceration and other educational writings from a prisoner's point of view, and the author notes that those works have been Mr Pecotic's contribution, "To ensure young prisoners and mature students touring prison facilities can gain some first-hand insight into criminality and its pitfalls in being incarcerated and losing your liberty." ." And there are examples of his paintings attached to the affidavit of Mr Money, and they reflect, without descending to an aesthetic analysis the bleakness of his isolation, separation from his family members, so they're behind tab 8 of the annexure to that affidavit, they're variations on a theme, but they depict what appear to be train tracks leading to an enclosed space where a person, presumably a prisoner, is seated in a reflective position, sometimes looking more pained than at other times, but that space is also notched in such a way as to resemble the face of a clock, and on the train tracks leading up to it are various symbols of drug use, weapons, money, and the various other things that Mr Pecotic has now rejected. So those paintings were offered for display at various prisons,

The management panel reviews indicate that he's been well behaved since being transferred to Olearia in August of 2016. But they're also one of a number of educational projects that he's

committed himself to. Behind the letter of Mr Selisky are a number of his prison writings. Some of them as I've said are didactic poems. They were for publication in a prison newsletter. Initially the expectation was that they would be published anonymously in that context, he elected to attach his name to them, and some of these writings have also been, as I understand, made available for display in common areas of prisons.

So the titles of those works, "The life of gaol ain't good, and all sad. It's not fun, but a life wasted. True." The next one is titled, "What it's like being on the inside." There's a writing about "Dangers/threats posed being in gaol" and then two poems. Again, they reflect, to some extent, his misery at his conditions, but these are writings to an audience of younger prisoners, and they have didactic purpose, and that comes through quite clearly, as well, as I've said, his rejection of his exploits, reputation, and the lifestyle that he led at the time that he was committing these offences.

He regards himself, as Your Honour can see from the first of those writings, as now a lonely old man in gaol whose short-lived, fast, action-packed moments didn't last long at all, whereas the years in gaol are doing. That says less about his mental state than a proper psychiatric assessment would do, but he is engaging in these projects. One of the others was an attempt as part of a prison literacy program to author a number of works for even younger children, but they do bespeak a change in attitude, a sea change since his incarceration by Your Honour, perhaps not observable at the time that he fell to be sentenced. As I understand his past appearances were in slightly different attire to what he's wearing now. Often fatigues, but he's endeavouring to reform himself to the best of his ability within the restraints imposed by his environment.³¹

DR FITZGERALD: And if it please, Your Honour, I have instructions, as you may recall, to appear for Mr Pecotic on the last occasion. What has occurred today is that those instructions have been withdrawn. That was subsequent to the communications with the court this morning filing new material, and indicating that Mr Pecotic intended to give evidence. He has reflected on that position overnight and has determined to assume the carriage of the case itself, but as I understand, insofar as new materials have been provided to the court, I do have his dispensation to formalise the tender of those materials and that he will rely on them and rely on the materials hitherto filed and the submissions made at the last hearing.

HIS HONOUR: All right. I just, I might address some remarks to Mr Pecotic now. If you could just be seated for a moment, Dr Fitzgerald. Mr Pecotic, I gather you want to take over the carriage of this plea and run it yourself this afternoon. It's your right to do that.

ACCUSED: Yes.

HIS HONOUR: Can I just say this that I was very much assisted by Dr Fitzgerald's plea last time. I thought he did an extremely good job.

ACCUSED: I am not saying he didn't.

HIS HONOUR: Yes.

ACCUSED: But the thing is - this is the thing, they requested a psych report at Forensicare. I spent over half an hour. I went into greater detail, what my actions, what my (indistinct words) and what arrived - I have actually written new letters last year, September, and I think that is the 12th letter and arriving - what caused me to arrive at me taking this course of action in revealing myself completely in these crimes, okay? I mentioned it. I've mentioned it to Pamela Matthews. I've

mentioned that to my counsellor on a number of occasions. I have never hid that, but he doesn't want to show that. I feel that there are significant aspects towards my mental state and you haven't really had an opportunity to gauge me properly from the dock. Last time I was muted, okay. (Indistinct) represented me in a way is upsetting me.

HIS HONOUR: I understand that.

ACCUSED: Listen, I was dressed in fatigues. I wanted to portray an image - a certain image to convey to them to try and alarm and scaremonger what people have produced and spat out onto the street. I mean, that was about -that was in the plea. The Life on Mars document. I have got another document of updated stuff, okay, that I would seek to tender to the courts too. It's far more advanced. It's a lot cleaner. It's a lot technical and it's compelling reading. (Indistinct words) and the thing is that's just (indistinct) we'll get into that a little harder. But you need to really appreciate and understand who I am, what I am, and Mr Fitzgerald is a good advocate on my part, but he is not speaking for me. You need to hear my voice. You need to hear what is going on in the back of my brain, seriously, you know what I mean? I'm happy to - - -

DR FITZGERALD: - - - in which Mr Pecotic is now incarcerated and a letter from Les Twentyman, a noted Western suburbs social worker.

HIS HONOUR: I know who Mr Twentyman is.

DR FITZGERALD: Which relates to one of the matters that was dealt with or one of the headings that was dealt with at the last plea which was rehabilitation and measures to undertake reform.

HIS HONOUR: Yes.

HIS HONOUR: You are excused, Dr Fitzgerald.

DR FITZGERALD: Thank you, Your Honour.

HIS HONOUR: Thanks for your assistance again.

HIS HONOUR: Yes. All right. You can give evidence from the dock. Mr Malouf will need to swear you in. I gather you wish to use the Quran?

ACCUSED: Yes.

HIS HONOUR: Have we got the Quran here? Yes. We will do that now, Mr Pecotic.

ACCUSED: Thank you. <CHRISTOPHER DEAN PECOTIC, sworn:

HIS HONOUR: Mr Rose, I will not be offended if you turn your back on me. MR ROSE: Good, Your Honour. I will try not to do too much. I will sit halfway. I want to hear and see.

ACCUSED: I will try and do this the best I can. It's - there's a lot of material I want to try and do. I'm not going to try and waste the court's time at all, Your Honour. I've got my own, like, little tactic, or plan of attack. And you'll see, within a few moments, it'll all start to come together, okay? All I ask you just be patient with me, and just, you know, I don't mean to offend anyone in the process. I'm raw, as you know. I'm direct. I've gotta work on my social skills at times, you know. I'm still working on them, you know, but you know, I mean, but I, I like to try and convey a message,

HIS HONOUR: These can be your written submissions on that matter.

MR PECOTIC: Yes.

HIS HONOUR: And that will cover that area of this hearing and I will read this material over

MR PECOTIC: Yeah, yeah, that's perfect. I'm not - I have no - no intentions to go through that, Your Honour.

HIS HONOUR: No. **MR PECOTIC: Like, that's crazy shit, you know, it's - -**

HIS HONOUR: Yes, keep going.

MR PECOTIC: Okay. Because that explains a lot really at the end of the day. You want to get into

my mind, okay, you want to understand and begin to understand. It's taken me a long time to work myself out. I (indistinct words) is bad. Like, I said if I was a painting I'd be a Picasso coming from the Cubism period. HIS HONOUR: Yes, all right.³².

HIS HONOUR: Yes.

OFFENDER: So if I can just go to the current isolation. I'm in Allaria and I mentioned that in the isolation or the intro to the proposed material that I seek to release - actually the book, you know, I'll say the book. It's not going to be in book stores. It's going to be - --

HIS HONOUR: Is this the stuff that I've already got that I looked at?

OFFENDER: Yes.

HIS HONOUR: Yes, I've read that.

OFFENDER: Yes. Now, what it is, and from p.1 to 62, that's the first part and it's the introduction. That's the heart and that's the soul of what I wish to convey to the general audience and stuff about isolation and all that sort of stuff and how - and that's the first part of the thing and that's going to be released on a website, it's going to go global and it's going to go deep into cyberspace. So it's going to be heard. But, you know, at p.43-45 relates to the post incarceration syndrome. Page 42 they talk about Allaria, that's where I am now. Okay. And that goes into detail. I don't think no-one else has been so comprehensive on their study and research on isolation units in the State to this level, you know, that I'm hoping people will be interested and excited and willing to begin to understand the dynamics of certain things and how it all makes sense, you know. Maybe - and I'm sure that academics, professors and psychiatrists will like this sort of material because they haven't got that stuff. That stuff's not really readily available, so hopefully maybe I can fill, tap into an area that no one's really provided on the area. Now, in Melaleuca I was doing like gardening there, there was like pots to do gardens and herbs and do some herbs and stuff. You know, nothing we could smoke but something we could just kick, you know, cook, you know, I'll have everyone cooking, yeah, in the pot, you know. And what's happened is since been moving Allaria that's not there, it's totally different dynamics. Before we were in a social environment where there was day room. You know, the cells would open up on to the day room like Acacia. You know, I don't know if you've been to Acacia but they open up to a day room. And you can - if you're out, if you have access to the day room you could speak to people, you could go to the window, you've got social contact. You go eye contact, you can interact and stuff like that. You can see these people, you know, and it's more of a community sort of environment, atmosphere, you know, where you're interacting and relating. Humans are social creatures, they thrive on interacting with people. Allaria doesn't offer that, Your Honour, you know. And that's the thing, it's designed on supermax like in America where it's deeply flawed. Their incarceration rates are like astronomical, it's just crazy, ludicrous. We would follow something that's flawed? There's over a million, like it's just crazy. Seriously, when they realise it doesn't work, it's detrimental to the inmates, the inmates become more crazy. I've got - I'll tell you, I'm not going to say the names but I'll say it, cell 30, okay, there's a 60-year-old man, okay, he is making - and I've got the reports too, okay, and that'll be a part, form part of my materials in that isolation stuff, okay, where I rely upon other inmates exposed their impact and how it's adversely affected, deteriorating him. He's started to make cat noises, animal noises, psyches have seen him. This is the thing that isolation does. This type of environment, okay, it's really affecting him. My other neighbour next to me, okay, cell 28, he's hearing - he's always constantly, like, probably once a day, twice a day, sometimes more, he thinks people are yelling out to him, "Are you yelling out to

me?" People of - imaginative people, people that don't even, are not even living in the unit. He's convinced, okay, that are there, calling out to him, "Are you calling my name?" I said, "Who are you talking to, man? Are you serious or what?" He's not here, mate, I can hear his voice, I know what his voice is like, so it doesn't matter what I've tried to say to, to try and alleviate his perceptions that people are calling out to him, I can't convince him. Then two other, a cell in - 23, okay, he's just recently arrived in that unit. He refuses to accept most of his new - they just do, this officer who was here, I said to him the other day yes or no, okay, he could confirm this, okay. He's so fearful his food is being poisoned by the staff. Well they're not happening, I have to say to him, "Mate, listen, they wouldn't do that buddy, please, they wouldn't do that, they're good staff here, okay" but he's so convinced, paranoid, that's what isolation does and he's refusing his meals, most of his meals, okay. The cell 22, forever yelling and screaming. Like full on fuckin' - sorry, full on crazy and like that's just some of the people that are round there. My own experiences are the same. Maybe I'm not - I once in the past refused to accept my food because I thought it was being tampered and I was being poisoned myself. There's medical reports on that. This is what isolation does, this is how it affects people. You know, some people are worse than others, you know. There is no, there is no real meaningful activity in our area, none whatsoever. It is designed where it is a strict one - strict back up with cells that come off a corridor. We don't see any other inmate. We don't come into contact with any unless, unless we're fortunate enough to be mixing, okay. I was on solitary confinement for four and a half years. That changed me in recent times, on 2 December, okay, last year, but up until then, four and a half years since I've been in the other area, okay, **I've noticed a marked, a shift in my mental state deteriorating. People say, "Oh you haven't been involved in the incidents and stuff" or whatever in Melaleuca, suicidal, all these self-harms, this and that. Since you've been in the area you haven't. The only reason why I haven't, because I've been - I have had to dedicate and commit myself to other projects that I need to complete and finish before I decide to move on and I will move on, seriously. That's how I feel, Your Honour. It's very difficult waking up every morning you know, I mean, to these circumstances. That's why I'm very, in a sarcophagus, in cement alive. Instead of roses on the coffin as my sarcophagus, I've got razor wire replacing it. That's how it is.** That's where I am and many others. When we get to that area that's the reality of it, you're buried there for a long time, you know, unfortunately that's the dire predicament I face and live with and it doesn't get - we haven't got herb gardens there, no painting or anything like that. I can't - all these sort of hobbies and activities, okay, that I was able to focus on before to take my mind off my surroundings and whatever, distract me, they're not available any more, they don't present themselves. **It's just harsh, sterile, oppressive, clinical. It's there for punishment.** Most of the people around me are all there for anti, like aggressive violence towards staff and other inmates. I haven't - I've been, if you have a look at all my reports and stuff like that, I have got, for the exception of when I first come into custody, I was still revving, okay, still revving hard from some of the ice exposure, but also from going into isolation within two, three weeks and the post-traumatic stress, with post-traumatic stress within four to six weeks you start to see the signs and symptoms and that coincides with when I started to act out and all those sorts of stuff, threatening - had psychotic episodes, having to go to the MAP to monitor my mental state behaviour. I was acting, I was violent towards staff which I'm normally - these officers will tell you, they've known me for a year, for some time, I'm always joking, I'm not anti-authoritative, I'm not swearing or aggressive or hostile or whatever. That was out of character for me for not - in my past, in my early days it wasn't out of character, it was the norm, I was doing all sorts of stuff towards them, but over the years I realised that I treat them as I find them. I see them, not the uniform, I see them for who they are, the soul. They've got character. I mean I joke with them and stuff like that, but you know it's just - I'm amongst these sort of inmates who have got a history of that in recent times.

Then we've got the isolation, the exposure that others suggest I attribute to austere conditions. I never said that. I never said that at all. But you know what, that's the reality. I'm exposed to that and there's the research, there's the material. There's a strong view of it being recognised now that it should be. They're promoting that it should be recognised as a mental state, okay, like a mental impairment, something, and that's as it should be because it's debilitating. Really it is, you know, it affects you. I mean it compounds things again, it's another level. And see, even the glasses, you didn't see me in glasses last time. I didn't need glasses. Isolation. And it's medical and scientifically proven, you know, shortening - because you're not getting the long sight, you're only short sight. Your eyesight is affected. These are just - - -

HIS HONOUR: The ageing process has something to do with it.

OFFENDER: Oh yeah, 100 per cent. I'm not discounting that, you know. I'm not that old, really, I mean I feel a lot older than I am, you know.

HIS HONOUR: Right.

Seriously, it doesn't go away. It stays with you until the day you die and you say you understand my frustrations and stuff? You don't understand, Your Honour. You may say - you haven't put - you haven't tried to asphyxiate yourself on a number of occasions, you haven't put tourniquets - um, um, um, you haven't gone - you haven't slashed your arms, okay, you haven't, um, um, um, um, um, done all sorts of things, swallowed stuff, you know, um, um, you haven't - actually, the canvas smock, rolled it up tight, so used it as a tourniquet around my neck, blacking out. You know, I mean, thinking it's over, it's gone, I'm out of here, to wake up I don't know how long later, stars, blanking oh, what the fuck, I'm still round. The white light, you know. I see a white light, I think maybe I'm somewhere else. It's not, it's the white light, still I'm in the cell, you know what I mean, and I'm still here. The only reason why I'm waking up because when you - when I - when I'm unconscious, I lost my grip, the power in my grip, you know, so losing the strength of the asphyxiation, so I come to. You know, and it's just coming back to this. My condition through the failure of others to hide, conceal, mislead, the facts, the truth, the extent of things, can only compound things, Your Honour.

HIS HONOUR: Pamela Matthews, a psychologist, expressed the view I think in March of this year that - well, she was pessimistic about you going to the distance. In other words, she was troubled about your capacity to self-harm - - -

OFFENDER: Listen, Your Honour.

HIS HONOUR: What I want to understand is how does that fit in with your recent conversion to Islam and does that assist you in seeing a way forward that is not self-destructive, that's what I want to know.

OFFENDER: Yeah, yeah, yeah. Your Honour, there are messages in the Koran where if you - they say you shouldn't, um, um, self-harm or anything like that, okay, but it is accepted if you are in defence, okay, of the innocent, the terrorised, you know what I mean, those that are suffering, okay, if you are ever in their way or you engage in their defence and you commit yourself and you sacrifice yourself for the pain and suffering of others, okay, then it is accepted, okay, and that's exactly the view - that's the view I see and the view I hold to my heart. It's - - - HIS HONOUR: But do you see a brighter future for yourself from the Koran? OFFENDER: You know what, Your Honour? This is the

thing. It's only divine intervention can help me here, is there, and that divine intervention, you know what I mean, is you, really. ³³.

- Minimal human contact leading to deskilling of communication skills, therefore making it harder to adjust on their eventual return to a mainstream environment or the community
- Prisoners believed to be "management problems" are likely to become a self-fulfilling prophecy (long term placements could result in perpetuating instead of preventing violent behaviour)
- Potential for "Stockholm Syndrome" between staff and prisoners, which could lead to staff corruption
- A reliance on static security systems
- Creates an environment of "no hope" and reinforces prisoners' perceptions of unfair treatment, leading to an increased risk of radicalisation
